# The Rabbi's Corner The High Holidays

This is the season of the year known to us as the High Holy Days. It is during this time for the Jewish Community to practice historical Judaism and for us at Aliyah Congregation who practice Tanakhee Judaism. This month we had three important holidays, which were instituted by God himself for us to observe. It just happens that they are very close to each other.

First, we just had Rosh Hashanah which was observed from sundown on September 9th and lasted until sundown on Sept 11th. Rosh Hashanah is the Hebrew word used by God himself and is described in Genesis 21:1-34 and also in Numbers 29:1-6; where He instituted it along with instruction for his followers to observe during this time. It is also commonly known as the Feast of Trumpets. This event is also mentioned by two of his followers in their writings. The first to mention it was Samuel who lived during the Old Testament time in his first book, 1 Samuel 1:1-2:10. The other follower of our God who also makes reference to this holiday is Matthew in his Gospel, Matthew 24:29-36. Rosh Hashanah is the celebration for our New Year given by God Himself; and in our calendar it is the start of the year 5778. The count of years began with the creation of our ancestors Adam and Eve until

Secondly, we had the holiday known as Yom Kippur. It is a day for fasting and praying; *Leviticus* 16:1-34, 18:1-30, *Numbers* 29:7-11, and *Matthew* 25:31-46. It is also known as the Day of Atonement. This is a day that Gods' followers are to use exclusively to seek God and ask his forgiveness for all our sins (known and unknown) for the year that has just passed. Also on this date we are instructed to deal with our sins for the preceding year in relation to others. We are instructed to correct our faults in relation to our fellowman to whom we may have acted incorrectly or unrighteously during the preceding year. Reference is made to this day in *Leviticus* 22:26-23:44, *Numbers* 29:12-16, *Zachariah* 14:1-12, *Luke* 2:1-2, *John* 7:1-10 and *John* 7:31-43.

Thirdly, we have the holiday of Sukkot, also known as the Feast of Tabernacles. It started at sundown September 23rd and lasted for 8 days. We are instructed to dwell in tents (temporary dwellings) for 8 days and remember how our ancestors lived in the heat of the sunny desert for forty years. This Holiday is very good at getting us out of our comfort zone just as with our ancestors many years ago.

Through our obedience to His instruction to us, we hope to affirm with our actions to Him and to the entire universe that He is our God whom we have chosen; to whom we are committed, to obey, love and to follow for the rest of our existence on this plant called earth

In Messiah's love we hope that you, my dear reader will find his path and direction to your life's future.

Shalom to you.
