The two most pressing issues in my district are going to be the future of water availability and the rapidly expanding growth in Colorado Springs as there is an interplay between these two items. State budget priorities, for me, are being addressed by amendments 73 and Amendment 110 but I feel modification of the interplay of Tabor Gallagher amendments 19 and 23 need to be addressed to untie the bottleneck we have with providing funding for State projects.

COUNTY COMMISSION DISTRICT 1

The most pressing issue facing our county is the adequacy of water resources to support both current community needs and future development. I will ensure that this resource is protected and not over-committed as our county grows. I will also work to integrate the various water providers into a better and more efficient system to serve our long-term needs. The significant growth our county faces means we also must ensure that land use decisions are well planned and sustainable for the future. I will strive to ensure that any new development includes the appropriate infrastructure; provides sufficient fire department, sheriff, EMS, and other public safety resources; and protects our environment, open spaces, and natural resources.

The primary budget priority must be the health and safety services for our citizens. This is followed closely by repairing and maintaining the infrastructure that our citizens depend on, particularly our degraded roads and bridges. We must also improve and expand our bus service to serve more citizens throughout the county, providing needed transportation for elderly and lower income citizens. Lastly, we need to get serious about implementing a light-rail system between Colorado Springs and Denver. These can be funded through better management of our existing county finances, and in the case of light-rail, through a public-private partnership.



Transportation infrastructure including roads and bridges and water resources. I will work to ensure existing transportation revenue streams are used wisely and advocate for additional funding to relieve traffic around our military bases including Fort Carson, Peterson, and Schriever. Powers needs to be widened and extended north to Interstate 25. Additional north-south routes and east-west routes need to be completed as planned to reduce impact of local vehicles on rural roads through Black Forest and northern El Paso. I will support a citizen vote to extend the Pikes Peak Rural Transportation Authority sales tax to fund

I will advocate for long-term water needs through the Pikes Peak Regional Water Authority and for regional agreements that share pipelines (and the building of pipelines) and storage facilities. I will also closely monitor water decisions at the state level and model proposed solutions based upon other regional solutions in

First, funding for transportation issues in El Paso County through existing revenue streams, including the road impact fee for new subdivisions and a renewal of the PPRTA sales tax. Second, I support the Public Safety Funding renewal and will prioritize funding to public safety to protect our community and to prosecute illegal marijuana grow operations. Third, additional jail space if necessary through funding separate treatment facilities for detox and inmates with mental health issues. Fourth, continued funding of parks and trails to maintain our quality of life. Finally, additional support for statutory functions.

Lewis Palmer School District 38 Issues 4A and 4B

4A Increases taxes \$1 million per year for 7 years to fund additional safety and security staff and training for D38 schools including charter schools.

4B Authorizes \$36.5 million in bonds to construct a new elementary school and convert Bear Creek Elementary back to a middle school, in addition to security improvements for all D38 schools, including Monument Academy.

SUPPORTERS say: These measures will help address capacity needs created by growth in the district. All students and schools will benefit from improved security and safety.

OPPONENTS say: Property taxes would increase. Proposed improvements are not correlated to increased academic achievement.
