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The Rabbi's Corner Consequences

In the past six months I have presented to you, my dear readers, five articles about the most important commandment. And in last month's article, I covered the Limitation of God's Vocabulary, because He was lacking in the use of the word trinity. This limitation in God's vocabulary was assessed and corrected by the bishops (over 300 of them) who assembled and put their minds to work at the Nicaean Council. In this way, they were able to provide to God the word he was lacking in his vocabulary so that today there is nothing for us to worry about because those very intelligent bishops were there to cover the area of need in God's vocabulary by providing to God the word "trinity" and the problem was solved.

Yet the issue still remains, because this word is not found in the entire bible and it is totally contrary to what God himself told his people in the desert (*Deut* 6:4) and years later what he told his people in Jerusalem (*Mark* 11:28-30). In both references, He stated, "God is One." For these reasons, I want to cover with you today the consequences of upholding this non-biblical view or the teaching of a man-made invention; the so-called trinity. In my view, such a teaching is negative in three different aspects:

First of all, it makes our position about the entire bible confusing; because most believers will affirm that every word in the bible is truth. If such a position or affirmation is correct, where is the word trinity found in the bible? And most importantly, we have no right to add or subtract from His word (*Deut 4:2*).

Secondly, it makes our message to the Jewish community unacceptable, because Jews are very careful to obey God's instruction, "I am YHVH your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the abode of slavery. You are to have no other gods before me." (*Exodus 20:2-3*). The teaching of the trinity is tantamount to idolatry from the Jewish perspective.

Thirdly, it invites an erroneous self contradictory understanding to the bible itself; because of what we read in the Gospel of John Chapter 1. There it states: "In the beginning was the Word"... also there it says that "the Word was God"...and finally it affirms "the Word became a human being and lived with us". It is our understanding that, the "Word" mentioned in this text is referring to God Himself, whom in His love for humanity, came to earth to offer Himself as a sacrifice to redeem all those who will chose to come to Him.

So the consequence of the decision is yours; to embrace what God says about Himself in his word or accept man's opinion or tradition as truth.
