Legacy Sertomans help fund home for injured veteran

On November 17, four members of Legacy Sertoma participated in a Homes for Our Troops Key Ceremony outside Parker, where Cpl. Nick Orchowski and his family were presented the keys to a new home at no cost to them. A flaglined driveway greeted the Orchowski family as they were delivered to the site by fire trucks and motorcycle escort.

Orchowski initially was diagnosed as a quadriplegic, never to walk again after being thrown from the gunner's hatch of a vehicle that was hit during an insurgents' attack in Bagdad, Iraq. However, he was able to walk up that driveway basically unassisted.

The \$5,000 raised at the Legacy Sertoma golf tournament held in July was part of the contributions that made the home a reality.

Homes for Our Troops, a national non-profit, builds specially adapted homes for service members who have been severely injured in combat operations since Sept. 11, 2001. All homes are built at no cost to the veteran served through the support of individuals, foundations, and corporate contributors. Legacy Sertoma will sponsor its second annual golf tournament next July 15, with proceeds again going to this top-rated charity.
