Lokken said the Palmer Lake Volunteer Fire Department has responded to 80 calls for the year and 24 for March. He said there is an outdoor burn ban in effect and if residents need to burn something outside, they should contact the department.

Staff reports

Town Clerk Berreth thanked the resigning board members and presented Coleman, Stafford, and Cressman with commemorative plaques.

Town accountant Linda Ousnamer of Pencil Pusher Inc. said that the town has spent 25 percent of the year's budgeted amount with a quarter of the year completed. She expressed continued concern regarding the police budget and

It was pointed out that the limited staffing of the Police Department makes it difficult to enforce this law while addressing other issues. The department seeks citizen assistance to report situations when unleashed dogs are encountered.
