The Rabbi's Corner Law or Grace? Part IV

...yet Paul did say: "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law." Galatians 3:13.

We have been discussing in previous articles (they are posted at aliyahcongregation.com) two laws. One written by God himself and one written by Moses.

Is Paul saying that one or both of these laws are a curse? What thought is Paul attempting to convey by the above statement that is so often repeated by dear brothers and sisters? Is he saying that the law written by God is a curse? In *Romans* chapter 7 and 8, Paul refers to four different laws. Which one or all of these laws is he referring to with this declaration?

Or is Paul attempting to tell us that Messiah has redeemed us from that which the law curses? In this hypothesis, it would be sin as we understand it. And if this hypothesis is correct, what are those who teach against obedience of Gods' laws doing? Because Paul also said: "the Law is holy and the commandments are holy, righteous and good." *Romans 7:12*.

So again, is Paul saying that the very same law that in *Galatians* is a curse, but here in *Romans* it is "holy", "righteous" and "good"? How can that be? It surely would be good to hear a coherent explanation from the self-appointed anti-law experts.

Sometimes, people with limited knowledge arrive at precipitous conclusions and achieve disastrous results. For this reason we have offered classes this summer for those wanting to explore more about the Hebrew faith. We still have three more Monday evening classes to offer.
